Know Your Protest Rights

- 1. You don't need a permit to protest in response to breaking news and you don't need a permit to march in the streets or along sidewalks, as long as you're not obstructing traffic or access to buildings.
- When you are lawfully present in any public space, you have the right to photograph anything in plain view, including federal buildings and the police.
- 3. If you believe your rights have been violated, when you can, write down everything you remember, get contact information for witnesses, and take photographs of any injuries.
- 4. If you get stopped by police, ask if you're free to go. If they say yes, calmly walk away.
- 5. If you get arrested, you have a right to ask why. Otherwise, say you wish to remain silent and ask for a lawyer immediately. Don't sigh, say or agree to anything without a lawyer present.
